

## The AASuccess Huyen's Road Project - A Catalyst for Change

When AASuccess embarked on this roadbuilding venture in the small town of Hau Giang, the challenges were evident. The project required a significant commitment to building and maintaining trust across cultural divides. Aligning Vietnamese expectations with American standards of transparency and accountability involved numerous stakeholders, each playing a crucial role despite historical mistrust and opacity.

Yet, AASuccess's enduring commitment, rooted in nearly two decades of community service and development, provided a credible foundation that gradually won over our partners. This project vividly illustrates how perseverance and genuine intent can overcome skepticism.

For the students of AASuccess, this project is an unparalleled educational experience. Studying engineering or project management in a classroom is one thing; applying these skills on the ground, confronting real-world challenges, and making tangible contributions to a community's welfare is entirely another. Every meter of road laid not only enhances their technical skills but also deepens their understanding of the socio-economic landscape of rural Vietnam. This insight into the complexities of business development projects is invaluable, instilling a sense of responsibility and a spirit of innovation that textbooks alone cannot provide.

Meticulously overseen by our Vietnamese partners, the construction site meets all durability standards and contract specifications for at least ten years. The local community's celebration of the final road sections marks the unveiling of a new route and symbolizes the strengthened relationships and trust that have emerged. This initiative has created both a literal and metaphorical pathway in Hau Giang, laying the groundwork for future collaborative endeavors that enhance quality of life through cultural and economic exchanges.



The journey to where I stand today in the Hau Giang road project is not marked by mere academic achievements or a seamless series of successes. Instead, it is a profound lesson in growth, born from confronting fears and overcoming personal barriers. Engaging actively in a project where all exchanges were in Vietnamese, a language I struggled with due to my international schooling, was daunting. Yet, this became a pivotal experience for me, underscoring the essence of true learning and adaptation.

My early reluctance to ask questions, stemming from a fear of judgment, was a barrier I had to confront head-on. This project taught me that the real world values effort and intent over perfection. The local experts and community members didn't expect flawless Vietnamese or an

expert-level understanding from me. They valued my willingness to learn and engage, which was far more significant. This realization helped me transition from a passive observer to an active participant, using my role to bridge gaps not just in communication, but in cultural understanding. By stepping out of my comfort zone and engaging directly with the local committee, I not only managed to overcome my linguistic insecurities but also successfully introduced one of our AASuccess student's "Go Green" initiatives, gaining approval to enhance the project with environmental benefits. This wasn't just a victory for the project; it was a personal triumph over the insecurities that had held me back.

As we near the completion of the Hau Giang road, I reflect not only on the road we've built but on the journey I've undertaken personally. This experience has reshaped my understanding of success, teaching me that our greatest achievements often lie in the struggles we overcome and the growth we experience. AASuccess embodies this philosophy, nurturing individuals not merely to succeed but to grow through their challenges and to contribute meaningfully to their communities. In this journey, every step, every misstep, and every recovery is celebrated as part of the invaluable process of building not just roads but people.


#### The Go-Green Team's Adventure
