Nurturing Tomorrow's Leaders Through Our Circular Learning Ecosystem





As we transition from spring into summer, I'm reminded of how growth in nature mirrors the development we foster at AASuccess (AAS). Just as March brought the first blooms of potential showcased in our previous newsletter, May reveals our circular learn-work model that depends on a community that believes in investing in purpose-driven individuals from all walks of life.

What makes our model unique is its sustainability: former mentees become mentors, participants become contributors and/or volunteers, and every resource we invest multiplies in impact. Through our programs, we are able to tap into the strengths and gifts of everyone at AAS, from students to mentors, so that they can reach their best selves. Character and mindset are the focuses of development, and we intend to use that growth to create sustainable change in our communities.

What distinguishes AASuccess? We develop character before credentials. Through our 20-year model and US-IBDC network, students immediately engage real projects - from Vietnam healthcare initiatives to local education programs - regardless of their starting point. No rigid prerequisites, but we do assess for hidden potential and readiness for long-term growth. Just character potential and willingness to grow through our distinctive 3H-3S-3A methodology (Head-Heart-Hands, See-Seek-Seize, Attitude-Action-Authenticity) and core values: emotional intelligence, courage/grit, innovation, crucial conversations, and empathy.

With \$100,000 annually, we leverage resources strategically: High achievers like YouthCon winners work alongside eighth grade AAS students like Tyler and Leo, creating mutual growth. This mirrors how business professionals engage our network - everyone gains value while contributing to others' development.

In this newsletter, you'll see this principle in action across multiple generations of our ecosystem. From YouthCon scholarship recipients presenting innovative community solutions, to the middle and high school management teams that organized the entire program, to Derica Dang's transformation from shy newcomer to confident researcher, to our new junior college interns developing real-world project experience, each represents a different stage in our development pipeline.

With a modest annual budget under \$100,000, we're developing 30 future leaders through year-round teaching, coaching, mentoring, and impactful project work provided by like-minded adult volunteers. What allows this efficiency is our circular model, wherein students don't just learn skills, they apply them by teaching and leading others, creating an ever-expanding network of impact.

This wouldn't be possible without our dedicated donors and partners. 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Welcoming Our New Junior Interns: The Next Generation of Impact-Driven Leaders


Meet Kathleen Pham, Emily Lieu, and Xandra Phan!

We don't eliminate challenges; we develop the resilience and wisdom to navigate them productively through character and mindset transformation. This development creates an ecosystem that remains sufficiently attractive to leverage existing resources and draw professionals and healthcare experts who willingly contribute time and efforts in exchange for their own benefits and growth. Vivian's engagement with physicians through our healthcare initiatives while simultaneously mentoring newer college learners like Kathleen Pham of UVA, Emily Lieu of VCU, and Xandra Phan of VA Tech exemplifies this mutual benefit model where everyone reaches their best selves.

This dual role, being both learner and teacher, represents the "circular learning" that makes our ecosystem sustainable. Celebrating YouthCon 2025: Student-Led Innovation for Community Impact

YouthCon 2025, sponsored by Eden Center (Falls Church, Virginia) for more than a decade, demonstrates how AASuccess transforms young learners into effective leaders. This student-led initiative was managed by middle and high school students under the mentorship of our Operations Team, whose members are senior university students of AAS.

Led by Leo Tran and Tyler Le, 8th graders at Katherine Johnson Middle School and Liberty Middle School, the YouthCon 2025 team demonstrated exemplary project management skills by handling every aspect of this complex program, from creating application systems to organizing judging panels and coordinating outreach to schools across the Northern Virginia area. The mentorship from Angelina Le and other senior students taught both Leo and Tyler how to communicate effectively, handle conflicts, and stay accountable under pressure.

We're proud to announce this year's winners, selected from an impressive pool of applicants who presented innovative solutions to community challenges:



1st place: Elizabeth Uranta, 11th Grade, Osbourn Park High School

Elizabeth's "Empowering Equity Through Access" initiative addresses menstrual inequity in schools through a technology-driven approach. Her mobile-friendly website connects donors, volunteers, and schools to facilitate the donation and distribution of menstrual products, while providing educational resources and impact tracking for transparency.



2nd place: Katie Lopez, Junior, Duke Ellington School of the Arts

Katie's "Spa Day" project will provide homeless individuals with haircuts, pedicures, and hygiene kits to restore dignity and confidence. Starting at a local church with community support, her initiative addresses both physical and psychological well-being for unhoused individuals.



3rd place: Claribel Davis, Freshman, Great Mills High School

Inspired by her late brother, Claribel's "Hope for the Kids" nonprofit initiative aims to fund cancer treatment for children whose families cannot afford care. Starting with website development and awareness building, her project demonstrates how personal experience can fuel meaningful community impact.

YouthCon 2025 demonstrates our resource-leveraging philosophy: Scholarship recipients Elizabeth, Katie, and Claribel now work alongside emerging managers Leo and Tyler. High achievers gain character depth; developing students gain confidence - mutual growth that creates genuine value for all.

Mai Linh Ho exemplifies this model: Former YouthCon recipient, now Co-founder & Chief Product Officer at Gateway, returning as judge. Everyone contributes. Everyone gains.






From School Project to Social Impact: Derica's Agent Orange Research

How Level 1 students develop research skills with realworld applications

When Derica Dang (Junior of Annandale HS) joined AASuccess as a Level 1 student, she was quiet and hesitant about her abilities. Through crucial conversations within AASuccess, she revealed a budding interest in humanitarian issues, particularly the ongoing impact of Agent Orange in Vietnam.

Under the guidance of Dave Nguyen, Derica has developed a comprehensive research document examining the historical context of Agent Orange, its ongoing health effects, and the specific challenges facing families in Quang Tri Province. Her findings, including the fact that \$1,000 can build a basic housing unit for affected children, are now informing potential collaboration between AASuccess and NGOs working in Vietnam.

Derica exemplifies our approach: We recognize potential others miss. No impressive résumé required - just curiosity and empathy for humanitarian issues. Through immediate access to real projects via US-IBDC, her Agent Orange research now informs NGO collaborations in Vietnam. Quiet students often create the most profound impact.
